discount rates available otherwise. Flyers are on our table.

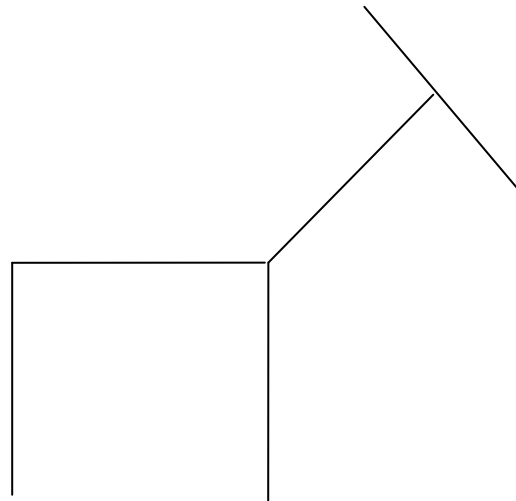
63rd Annual Silver State (Reno) Mainstream thru Challenge Grand Sierra Resort, May 28 – 30

- She grew up in Berkeley, but when still a teenager spent time coming over to Marin because it was a place where “grownups never grew up.” Later as a stock broker she moved here for good.
- Her dad obtained a PhD in biochemistry from UC Berkeley and started working with Robert Oppenheimer and Edward Teller of atomic bomb fame. Setter/Cleaner Uppers

If you can't come on your assigned date, please arrange a substitute and let our hospitality chair, Gen Sheppard (488-1827), know. Those assigned for a given month are asked to bring a treat for party night on the last Wednesday of the month.

SET-UP DUTIES: Arrive by 6:30 pm. Heat and light switches are in the back room if needed. If it is still light you can wait to turn on the parking lot lights, but no later than 8. Prop open the side door. Get ice from the bar before it closes at 7; Fill the cooler, put out cups, snacks, and marking pen. If tables are set up, stack enough to leave room to dance. Set up chairs around the hall and the caller table on the stage. Set up the hospitality table with the guest sign-in book, member sign-in sheets, flyers, and solo rotation sheet. If it is hot, set out the fans stored in the supply closet room – one in the doorway of the side room and the other near the bar. An extension cord is in our supply closet.

CLEAN-UP DUTIES: Empty the cooler, clean up cups and other trash. Place flyers and other items in the plastic bin and then put it and all other supplies back in our supply closet; tables and chairs can be left out. If the fans are out, return them and our extension cord to the storage closet room. When leaving, close but do not lock all doors.
